Spokane, Washington.

Major R. H. Wimpy came with his family to eastern Washington in 1872 and located on a ranch on Hangman Creek, near where Latah now stands. In the fall of this same year another family came from Walla Walla and located on the site of the present town of Spangle. In this family were William Spangle, who gave the town its name, his wife and four children.

In 1874 Joseph Wimpy, the oldest son of the Major, married Emma H. Spangle when she was but seventeen years of age.

Bell Wimpy, a daughter of the Major, married a Mr. King and they moved to Spokane Falls.

Emma H. Spangle was born in Illinois, 22 March 1858. She married Joseph Wimpy in 1874. Her daughter, Mrs. Willie Couchman lives at Spokane, her oldest son is in California, her youngest son Earl is in Spokane.

Wimpy's wife died and he married a second time.

24 November 1929

John C. Davenport was born in New York in 1830. After some years he found his way to Colfax, Washington, where he located in 1873. Prior to that time however, he had married Sarah A. Lowe and five children were born to them. Homer M., the oldest, at one time County clerk of Shoshone Co. Ida. Mary, now Mrs Robert Ewart, whose daughter is the wife of Charles F. Lund of Spokane, Josephine, who married C. B. Hopkins of Telephone fame; A. Lincoln, now a prominent business man in Aberdeen, Washington, and Eva, the wife of A.L. Paine, for many years in the lumber business in Aberdeen.
